# **2021 FUNDED PROGRAMS**

Brooke USA made contributions to an array of programs across the globe, as well as right here in the United States.



## **ADVOCACY FUND**

Efforts to ensure a ban on the import and sale of "ejiao," the product derived of boiling donkey hides for use in traditional Chinese medicine, in the United States.

# **AFRICA FUND**

- Community training for women on how to protect and safeguard their donkeys as the donkey trade threatens communities across Kenya.
- Purchase of an-all terrain vehicle for Brooke East Africa, facilitating delivery of programming (training and education) across the East African territory.
- Construction of veterinary and health clinics for rural communities in Ethiopia where owners and their animals normally walk long distances to access veterinary care.
- Building access points to ensure safe and sustainable water supply systems for communities faced with extreme challenges in Ethiopia.
- Distribution of crop and fodder seed kits to communities across Senegal and Burkina Faso which are exposed to draughts and other environmental threats.

### **AMERICAS FUND**

- Native American Horse Education Foundation Tucson, AZ
- Provision of horseshoeing certifications to four members of the Apache tribe.
- Native Horsemanship Youth Program Poulsbo, WA Provision of feed for senior horses serving youth on the Port Madison Reservation.

### **DISASTER & EMERGENCY FUND**

The Board of Directors of Brooke USA grants funds to geographic areas where disaster has made life difficult for equines and their owners.

- Sonoma CART (Community Animal Response Team) Santa Rosa, CA. Purchase of fire safe jackets for volunteers in the field deployed to provide disaster response to animals during a wildfire.
- Napa CART (Community Animal Response Team) Napa, CA. Rescue assistance to equines during the Glass Fire which raged through the wine country.
- Texas Equine Veterinary Association Foundation El Dorado, AZ. Veterinary assistance to equines greatly affected by Hurricane Ida which made a landfall in Southern Louisiana.
- Equitarian Initiative Haiti. Assistance to equine owners and AgHorizon Veterinary Tech & Agricultural School students affected by the 7.2 magnitude earthquake that struck Haiti's Southwestern Peninsula.



### **ASIA FUND**

- Training and education of brick kilns workers in India to provide their animals with respite from the sun and access to water.
- Training and education of donkey owners in the coal mines of Pakistan where extreme temperatures from the cold outside to the extreme heat underground, causes lameness and disease.
- Emergency funding for equine owners in India to provide quality feed and fodder and replenish first aid veterinary kits.

### **COVID-19 RESPONSE & RECOVERY FUND**

The Fund was established to provide micro-grants and aid fellow nonprofit organizations which were financially affected by the pandemic and potentially at-risk of not fulfilling their mission.


### **Operating Reserve**
